Individuals who do not have symptoms but who are at high risk of developing ocular abnormalities related to systemic diseases, such as diabetes mellitus and hypertension or who have a family history of eye disease, require periodic comprehensive eye examinations to prevent or minimize visual loss.

Until modalities are in place to prevent or cure diabetic retinopathy and other complications of diabetes mellitus, emphasis must be placed on identification, careful follow-up, and timely treatment, including laser photocoagulation, for patients with diabetic retinopathy and diabetic eye disease.

For cataracts that interfere greatly with vision, doctors usually remove the lens of the eye and replace it with a new artificial lens. In people with diabetes, retinopathy can get worse after removal of the lens, and glaucoma may start to develop.
